

## **New Approaches to Moderating Violent Extremism**

**WHAT:** Nineteen leaders from **Pakistan, Lebanon, Bosnia, and Rwanda** are beginning their second week in the United States learning from one another's experiences working to moderate violent extremism. On **Jan. 20**, they will release recommendations for what the international community can do to support their work.

The leaders have participated in public events in Cambridge, Mass., including attending courses at Harvard's Kennedy School of Government. They now head to Washington, DC to interact with hundreds of decision makers from the U.S. government and military, foreign governments, private security contractors, regional security organizations, and non-governmental organizations.

**WHO:** Members of Parliament, civil society leaders, journalists, and academics from **Pakistan, Lebanon, Bosnia, and Rwanda**, with expertise ranging from Pakistani national defense strategies to Rwandan post-conflict reconciliation. **Ambassador Swanee Hunt**, chair of The Institute for Inclusive Security, will lead events throughout the two weeks. **News legend Dan Rather** will participate in some Washington, D.C. events. **(Additional participants may be found on the following pages.)**

**WHY:** Countering violent extremism is now one of the primary goals of foreign policy in the United States and in NATO countries. While traditional counterintelligence strategies have continued to work in some contexts, they have been costly in lives lost, money spent, and damage to national reputations. Decision makers in the United States and its allied countries have rarely considered the particular contributions that women in leadership positions make to moderating extremist voices and activities.

These two weeks represent the first time that such a large number of women leaders have gathered to exchange success stories on this topic and advocate to decision makers in the United States. The recommendations that emerge from the discussions and meetings promise to point the international community in a new direction for engaging violent extremists and creating more sustainable peace.
